Llandover Woods



Llandover Woods is a forested open space in Northwest Seattle, acquired by the City of Seattle in 1995. This nine acre property is adjacent to the City of Shoreline and forms a contiguous greenbelt with forests in The Highlands neighborhood.

The open space features a 0.6 mile walking trail which allows visitors to enjoy the beauty and serenity of this mature conifer forest.

Along the trail, you will see towering Douglas firs and big-leaf maples, surrounded by a sea of sword ferns and many native shrubs. You may also glimpse some of the animals who call Llandover Woods home. These include Douglas squirrels, chipmunks, barred owls, sharp-shinned hawks, and a wide variety of other birds. A prominent snag near the northern trail provides habitat to woodpeckers who can be seen and heard throughout the Woods.



Wildlife Habitat



Llandover Woods contains three different habitat types: conifer forest, conifer/deciduous mixed forest and deciduous forest. These diverse habitats are home to over 55 different plant species and over 30 animal and bird species. Friends of Llandover Woods maintains four active restoration areas within the open space.

In 2005, a vegetation management plan was developed for the forest by the Seattle Urban Nature Project, in partnership with the Friends of Llandover Woods. The plan was funded by a Seattle Department of Neighborhoods grant, and is available at www.seattleurbannature.org.

Stewardship



Friends of Llandover Woods (FoLW) is a community volunteer group dedicated to maintaining and improving the natural environment of Llandover Woods. Since 2004, the group has focused on trail maintenance and improvement, habitat restoration and invasive plant removal.
